Bottles And Bags Year Round Needs

Each night that Uplift goes out to serve the homeless of Kansas City besides giving them a hot meal and a drink, we also offer them items to help keep them warm and healthy. Two items that we use all of the time are plastic bags (the kind you get from the grocery store, Target, Wal-Mart, etc.) which we use to put the items that they need in. The other item is a 2-litre type bottle with its cap (pop, tea, juice, etc. - we don't take bottles that have had milk in them). We use these bottles to give the homeless water that they can use for drinking, cooking and cleaning up. These two items can be collected from individuals, churches and other groups. It would be a great service project for churches, schools and businesses.
